The sun has set over the inaugural edition of **Pavillon Afriques** at the Film Market at Cannes Film Festival.

Its mission was to provide an open access to resources which are seldom accessible to filmmakers from developing film markets, while giving an opportunity to the participating African countries to present their potential to the world.

Having this goal in mind, Pavillon Afriques was a **smashing success**. Yet, the actual happening of a pavilion gathering various African countries at Cannes Film Festival was a long shot. For decades, the idea was fostered by multiples organizations or individuals but never actually came to life.

So, when I decided – after 2 unsuccessful collaborations since 2017 – to bring what was then a project to completion, **it was a leap of faith**. But I had the vision that it was the right time to present the African talents to the most prestigious event in the movie industry because Africa deserves the best.

There were doubts. There were bumps along the road. There were so many bad omens. At many occasions, the temptation to give up was overwhelming.

All of this was paid back a thousandfold when I witnessed the enthusiasm, the vibrations under the pavilion ; when a speaker said "**we finally have a home**"; when participants came to me with tears in their eyes to say thank you.

The 1st edition is just the beginning of a journey that I wish is as long as the Cannes Film Festival itself. We are here to demonstrate that we share a vision and together we will do what it takes to keep it alive and make it happen.

I am pleased that so many embrace this vision and that Pavillon Afriques is its catalyst and showcase.

Pavillon Afriques: Connecting past, present and future

Since its inception in 1946, Cannes Festival has remained faithful to its founding purpose: to draw attention to and raise the profile of films, with the aim of contributing towards the development of cinema, boosting the film industry worldwide, and celebrating cinema at an international level.

The Marché du Film during the Cannes Festival is the world's biggest gathering of film industry professionals who come to sell films, find partners and expand their professional network. This space reunites 12,000 professionals, 3,200 producers, 800 festival programmers and 1,750 buyers.

Pavillon Afriques was the first tent at the Film Market section of the Cannes Film Festival dedicated to the film business within Africa and within the African diaspora.



The unique venue for movie trade and promotion displayed the diversity and plurality of African and African-descended film production, allowing stakeholders to meet, discuss, trade and share experiences.


This space had the main goals to showcase and promote the organizations vested in the African film industry; to offer a remarkable insight into the potential for growth across the continent and within the diaspora; and to be an exceptional networking platform aimed at providing stakeholders with an unprecedented access to the global film industry resources and professionals.

The expectations were definitely high, but they were also most certainly met, thanks to its comprehensive 10-day program, which included seminars, workshops, roundtables, exhibits, music, cocktails, one-on-one meetings, and showcases.

Being part of the Pavillon Afriques was an opportunity for participating countries to show the dynamism of their structures, to promote exchanges with a targeted public, to benefit from wide media coverage, and to enjoy a strong regional, national and global impact.




